Spring at Biltmore

March 26–May 21, 2026

Edith Vanderbilt's younger sister Pauline was both an avid letter writer and a frequent visitor to Biltmore. Pauline's letters to friends describe the time she spent here in glowing detail, giving us wonderful word pictures of the estate, especially during spring. In one March 1905 letter, Pauline describes Biltmore this way:

"I go out, either driving or walking or sauntering down with the children to feed the swans or settle on the library terrace with lots of books and read and read and read. The air is soft and warm, the hills change colour continually, there is no noise, no friction, no jar."

We agree with Pauline! There's no better time to enjoy Biltmore than spring, and we're more than ready to welcome all the vibrant blooms that appear across the estate.

"Shrubs including witch hazel, quince, and winter jasmine start budding first, letting you know the weather is changing," said Stacey Weir, Horticulture Manager. "Inside the Walled Garden where the surrounding stone walls keep the four-acre interior warmer, blooming bulbs like daffodils will be popping up ahead of our annual tulip displays."

As the season progresses, different varieties of azaleas line the Approach Road and blanket the Azalea Garden with brilliant color while the historic Rose Garden fills with bright petals and lush fragrances.

"Everything wakes up with a shout in spring," Stacey said, "and just as Pauline Merrell noted in her letter, Biltmore's glorious gardens and meadows and woodlands change color continually, giving you plenty of new reasons to visit throughout the season."





EXCLUSIVE EVENING ACCESS FOR LUMINERE GUESTS

On *Luminere* evenings, the historic zone surrounding Biltmore House, including Diana at Biltmore, Front Lawn, Stable Courtyard, South Terrace, and formal gardens (Italian Garden to Conservatory), will close at 6:30 p.m. for those without *Luminere* admission. You will be asked to exit at that time or visit Guest Services to purchase a wristband for the experience.

Get outdoors this summer!

Make the most of Summer at Biltmore with a wide range of outdoor activities, including more than 22 miles of scenic walking, hiking, and biking trails. Here are some great options:

Historic Gardens (walking)

Our historic garden paths incorporate the Italian Garden (gravel), Shrub Garden (paved), Walled Garden (paved), and Spring Garden (mulch). Routes stretch approximately 1–2 miles, depending on which paths you choose. Enjoy seasonal blooms with benches nearby to take a break and soak up the sun.

Azalea Garden (walking)

This mostly paved walking path can be accessed from either the Spring Garden or the Walled Garden. It is a great opportunity to go even deeper into Biltmore’s historic gardens, offering benches along the way, and leading to the Bass Pond Waterfall and the Boat House. Take in spectacular views across the Bass Pond at approximately 1 mile.

Lagoon Trail (walking, running, biking)

This mostly flat, paved trail leads to the Lagoon, which offers a striking view of the west side of Biltmore House. Start and end at Antler Hill Village for a pleasant 3-mile trip. The French Broad River and estate farmland provide great scenery as you explore the path.

Farm Trail (walking, running, biking)

This flat gravel and dirt road runs along the perimeter of Biltmore's grounds and the French Broad River in Antler Hill Village. Totalling 6 miles, this trail leads to the Arbor Trace Trail at one end and the Lagoon Trail at the other.

Deer Park Trail (walking, running, biking)

This challenging uphill trek is quite popular due to the stunning view of Biltmore House it offers. To extend the challenge, start at Antler Hill Village and take the Farm Trail to the Lagoon Trail, which leads to the Deer Park Trail. You can also access a trailhead through a decorative iron gate at the far end of the South Terrace

and Tennis Lawn steps, or by passing through gates from the Meadow Trail that leads to the Bass Pond.

In addition, summer is the perfect time to enjoy a leisurely horseback or carriage ride with sweeping views of the estate, try your hand at sporting clays, or "bird out" with our falconry program and relaxing guided bird walks.

PRESERVE

Our mission to preserve Biltmore as a privately owned, profitable, working estate is the central tenet that guides all our efforts. As a Biltmore Annual Passholder, you are part of our preservation story, and we appreciate your support of this National Historic Landmark.

Re-creating Flora

Flora, a statue near the Tea House, represents the Roman goddess of spring who signifies blooming flowers and renewal. In 2018, the statue underwent repairs to replace an arm, several fingers, and a garland that had been missing for decades. Six years later, Flora sustained more damage as a result of Tropical Storm Helene.

"The ceramic sculpture was copied after the French artist Antoine Coysevox's marble sculpture *Flore* ("Flora"). It was offered in a catalog dating back to 1886, along with three other sculptures installed on the South Terrace around 1900," said Nancy Rosebrock, Director of Conservation and Collections. "One of the only other known complete versions is in the collection of The Huntington Library, Art Museum, and Botanical Gardens in California. The curatorial team at the Huntington very generously allowed Biltmore to hire Direct Dimensions to scan their sculpture to help us with the re-creation process of ours."

Biltmore's Museum Services team has chosen to have *Flora* recreated in terracotta by Atelier Prométhée, Manufacture d'objets d'art, in France. The digital file is in their hands to facilitate the creation of a new sculpture. This file will also be kept as a permanent digital record for our archives. We hope to have the new sculpture in place next summer.

"*Flora* appears in the earliest known photos of the South Terrace after construction was completed. The statue acts as an anchor for the design intent of the South Terrace, drawing attention to the Tea House," Nancy said. "We believe George Vanderbilt was very active in selecting sculptures and their locations for the home grounds, so we knew it was important to bring the sculpture back to this space."

Picnics past and present

As we look forward to the start of *Luminere* later this spring, our estate chefs are working on delicious new options such as gourmet picnics to further enhance your evening experience.

In honor of their culinary efforts, let's look at picnics of the past while dreaming of good things to come.

According to Lauren Henry, Curator of Interpretation, picnics during the Victorian era were often elaborate, and creating a suitably rustic ambiance might require more effort than a formal banquet.

Hampers full of special delicacies were carried to remote outdoor locations along with a bewildering array of china and glassware, chairs, cushions, ground

covers, tents, sunshades, games, and amusements—plus all the children, pets, and any guests who happened to be visiting.

"The Vanderbilts enjoyed picnics at a special estate location known as 'Picnic Island', which you can still see situated in the Lagoon. At Edith Vanderbilt's request, a swinging bridge was added for easy access to Picnic Island and estate rangers even ensured there was no poison ivy growing there," said Lauren.

Although the swinging bridge is long gone, there are still multiple picnic baskets, metal serveware, and food canisters in our archival collection.

Green Goddess Potato Salad

Smooth, creamy, and delicious, this tangy potato salad from Estate Executive Chef Mark DeMarco for Cedric's® Tavern is a tasty riff on the classic flavor of Green Goddess dressing. Serve it as a savory side at casual gatherings with family and friends or bring it along to perk up your next potluck or picnic outing.

Serves: 4–6

Total time: 1 hour (active time)

Ingredients

- 2 pounds Yukon Gold potatoes
- 3 teaspoons Kosher salt, divided
- 1 bunch parsley (leaves only; remove stems)
- 1 tablespoon fresh dill, chopped
- 1 teaspoon fresh oregano, chopped
- ¼ teaspoon fresh tarragon, chopped
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil
- 1½ tablespoons apple cider vinegar
- ¾ cup mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 red onion, diced small
- 1 bunch celery, diced small
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground pepper

Instructions

Place potatoes and 1 teaspoon salt in pot and cover with 2 inches of water. Bring potatoes to a boil, then reduce to a simmer. Cook until fork tender, approximately 20 minutes.

Drain cooked potatoes well and place in a single layer on a sheet pan and refrigerate. Cool 1–2 hours so they are easier to cut.

Combine herbs, garlic, olive oil, vinegar, mayonnaise, and sugar in a bowl and mix until well blended. Add chopped red onion and celery. Set aside.

When potatoes are cool, cut into quarters or eighths, depending on size, and place in a bowl. Add herb dressing and adjust seasoning with remaining salt and pepper.


